The hot, sticky humidity of the Dominican Republic hit me like a brick wall as I stepped out of the airport after traveling all day. The wind felt refreshing as we headed to our hotel in the late night. As 13 of us crammed in a van that was made for only 10, I gazed out the window to brightly-lit buildings, signs, and crowds of people.

My name is Rachel Edwards and I'm a junior at IPFW studying graphic design and digital imaging. I was chosen by my department to travel abroad for an educational experience in a third world country. For a week I was able to document the country's culture, architecture, and landscape. With this experience

I was able to further my photography skills and learn how to interact with people that don't speak the same language as I do. I traveled alongside a non-profit organization, Barnabas Task, so that I could not only document photos for school, but also document the medical clinic and prayer support the Barnabas Task provided.

I also worked in the medical clinic during the day to help out any way I could. On the first morning, around 20 people were lined up outside the door waiting for us to open the clinic so that we could treat them. As we unloaded tubs of equipment, more and more people began to come and watch as we set up the clinic. Over the course of the week, we treated a little over 600 people who were given toothbrushes, vitamins, and other various medicines to treat common injuries and sicknesses. Because I don't have a medical background, I spent the majority of my time connecting with the kids exploring the area. We brought tubs of toys with us to give to the kids after they had been to the clinic. Hundreds of toy cars, dolls, stuffed animals, and puppets were given to the children.

Since I couldn't walk anywhere alone due to safety reasons, I explored with a local translator and another IPFW photography student who was selected by our department to

document Cien Fuegos. I focused my photos on the people, documenting their stories behind a lens the best I could. The buildings were another area I focused on documenting. The bright buildings and unique shape were intriguing and so foreign compared to houses that I am familiar with seeing in the United States. Most of the houses were single story and didn't have central air or running water within the house. Since it's so hot during the day, most people sat on their porch so it gave us the ability to meet more people and take their photos.

With this humbling experience, I take away more than just good photographs. It opened my eyes to how other people live and it made me appreciate my life even more. My time in the Dominican Republic was short-lived, but my memories will last me a lifetime.
