



COVID-19 Impact on Learning Survey Summary Spring 2020

In the spring of 2020, students were invited to participate in a survey, which seeks to identify any challenges associated with the transition to remote learning caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. Of the 6,489 students surveyed, 918 responded for a response rate of 14.1%. Below is a summary of the response distributions, followed by a series of appendices, which outline the open-ended answers.

As a STEM major, this is NO way to learn the complex material of a science course. I greatly detest learning online and very much am looking forward to returning to campus in the fall semester (providing we are allowed to do so).
At first I was uncomfortable and unsure how to use Kaltura, but my professor did a video on how to use it and I was ok to use it after further instruction.
At times it was difficult to know where the instructor would place information/comments in regards to assignments whether that be through email or blackboard.
being a arts student with a focus on ceramics not having access to the studio has put great strain on my classes. i cannot finish assignments because they need to be fired in a kiln physically and cannot be done online
Being in front of the screen all the time. It is tiring!
Course software was available in on-campus labs, however once online there was a slow transition for access to software and the best option for the course was to purchase software out of pocket
COVID-19 has hit business and finances hard and this has been making it rather difficult to keep up with my studies while trying to manage and maintain a business during this crisis. It has had a negative toll on my performance within school and is impacting my grades and overall GPA this semester. I think students should get a P=Pass for classes they attempted on but may have failed due to this crisis.

Downloading PowerPoints that contain a lot of data is troublesome.
Every single professor uses a different website to post all of their content. So trying to keep track of all the different places i need to turn stuff in and places i need to look to know what i have to do is quite difficult for both me and the memory space of my laptop.
Everything has been fine for me
Haven't had any technological issues so far.
How can you still collect a full semesters worth of tuition when I and many other students have stepped foot on campus since before Spring Break? The only technology fee I'm using is my own internet bill and electric bill. Obviously I know the institution will not refund but I just want someone to address it and make something up with an absurd excuse that probably took them 10 minutes while at their house with a 6 figure salary thanks to my tuition
I don't receive what's due until that week of instead of knowing on a syllabus what's due
I had no issues
I had no technological issues that were a challenge for me.
I had not had home internet before the quarantine, and acquiring that took 1.5 weeks after spring break, as I initially attempted to do all online learning through my mobile. Using only mobile was impossible for adequate maintenance of learning. Due to the use of PDFs for assignments, which often requires editing and combining them, I have been working with IT Held Desk for a few weeks trying

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to determine why I could not utilize Adobe Acrobat Pro DC resources to do basic PDF manipulation. Last night, when logged into a PFW computer remotely, I found it is because PFW is not licensed for that program, although there are around a dozen other Adobe programs it is licensed for. Now I have to do research to find which opensource PDF manipulation program will be best for doing basic work. I also have a printer that is 15 years old, which I use for a scanner, and have never had ink for it. Printing many course materials would be helpful, but I was doing all of that on campus prior to quarantine.
I hate online classes and they are not a equivalent replacement for in person classes.
I have a teacher who doesn't use Blackboard at all and I think it really hurt the presentation of his course when transitioning to online. I think that all teachers should be required to use Blackboard for classes in the event that something like this happens again so that it can be more structured.
I have access through my wireless provider on my phone, but am limited on hotspot availability. This forces me to engage less than I would like during online class meetings because I limit my use by avoiding video when I can. Living in the country I don't have reliable and affordable access to high speed internet.
I have not experienced any technological challenges as I'm already doing online learning.
I have reliable internet, it is just slow.
I haven't had any of these issues because I take all my classes online.
I haven't really had much issues- Zoom was new for me, but once I figured out how to do it, it wasn't bad.
I love the way classes are, but I wish they would do more video recordings, and then a day for actual in-class instruction for students with questions, or need for help.
I miss labs!
I returned to the university last semester working full time trying to find my perfect balance and while i attempted full time school it was too much and i ended up receiving a D in one of my courses, then this semester happens and i finally am killing it and all of the current global challenges spring about and now i am stuck with learning online which i am not a fan of or promoter of, I have had a hard time wrapping my head around a hood fix for this semester but with professors still holding the same material accountable on me, i cannot say that was fair nor do i think it is doable for some students, my personal situation may be different than others but this has killed all motivation i have had to continue, i do not like online school and i will never voluntarily choose it over being on campus, It seems as the semester come to an end my As and Bs are dropping to Cs and Ds while i am still struggling to find the time to finish, I dont know what the right choice wouldve been but continuing the same material and assignments was far from the correct choice in my field. i am mentally drained and discouraged by the end of this semester and i hope that means anything.
I was fortunate to not have trouble with any of these things except accessing library books. That was solved when I logged on to the Helmke Library page and got to chat with a REAL librarian who explained to me how to check out online books.
I would add not just familiarity but organization within the technologies. Some have things located in multiple places and the information is different. There needs to be one clear space for keeping requirements, not the syllabus, plus an updated syllibus, plus notes, plus the folder.

Only true for 25% of classes (1 out of 4)
Overall very displeased that no one has reached out about plans moving forward, I paid for in person instructors as some classes were not even offered online because of complexity issues and the lack of understanding and yet we still have to pay full price for classes we don't understand fully, as well we are stuck with the grades we get as most teachers have not even entered grades into the system over the last few weeks. Should be given part of the tuition back or credited these moving forward.
Overall, my instructors are adapting very well.
Professors have honestly been doing well in being accommodating while not taking away from our education
Professors seemed to lack motivation to provide feedback or quick grades. I felt most professors used this time like a "vacation". One of my professors didn't give me feedback on an assignment for 32 days.
Rural internet is oftentimes sketchy/slow, long buffering delays and missed conversations
Solidworks 3D software is no longer available to me
Some of my professors use a different professors videos and none of my professors do webex meetings and some refuse to
Some professors don't communicate at all and it is really hard to understand what to do at any point.
Some professors have been assigning more work since the university switched to online instruction. For some professors, this is a minimal issue, while others have multiplied the amount of work for the course by several times.
Some teachers had issues using technology that would have made the online class a lot smoother.
STAT 301 instructor needs to become more familiar with technology and meeting tools such as webex so that they can give lectures that way.

The computers are programmed to do only what they are told and when the program says multiply and it to subtract it and the videos do not match up to what the problems are on your papers.
The professors post videos that are 7 years old to teach the course instead of them recording it in the present

I feel that for my degree (nursing) that virtual learning is not the ideal way to learn. I feel that I do not get the education and learning that I require to practice safely in the health care field. I also feel that this is not the education that I have paid for.
I feel that the School of Music went above and beyond to accomodate students through this change. I had a couple classes scheduled for virtual meetings at the same time, and I felt bad because I wanted to be at both.
I found difficulty in arranging assignment due dates. This was problematic before the Covid-19 crisis, but became more prevalent during the transition to online classes, even though mine were already online.
I have felt more productive learning from home, and I save a lot of time not having to drive.
I have never been able learn well at home, so I do my most of my classes and outside classwork on campus.
I know it's probably just my case, but for me classwork seems to have become more of a second thought, not the main focus of my day. that's mainly cause the 2 classes that I do have offer nothing but reading, no lectures to watch, and yes I count power point viewing as reading. sure there were quizzes to do, but I did them in an hour of freetime and anything else I have to do is just reading, nothing else. and after I read all the stuff we're covering I still have like 3 weeks before the test, so it's not a good feeling for me

It feels like my schoolwork contintues into most of my weekend.
It is incredibly hard to work on school work when there is a global pandemic going on. There are things much bigger than my weekly discussion boards happening in the world. I'm not sure how I'm supposed to "engage thoughtfully with my peers" on a discussion board when I can't even find toilet paper in the store and my friends are losing their jobs left and right. I feel like I've been completely robbed out of my Bank Certificate education. These classes needed to be done in person and there was clearly no thought from the teacher as to what would happen if face-to-face classes weren't an option. My class is being conducted via email each week and I have to print dozens of pieces of paper and scan them back into the teacher to be graded. I know that no one could have prepared for this, but now I feel like I haven't learned a single thing in the last 8 weeks. I'm going to graduate with the same degree and certificate as students before me but I don't have the same knowledge as they did. I, and every other college student, was robbed of our education this semester.

Professors are unclear about expectations and not good with communication at all. Many have NOT made this transition easier. It is insanely stressful.

Recordings are lovely, because it really helps - at least me - with notes. If I miss something, I don't have to stop the lecturer with a question, I can jump back for a second - look - then jump back to where I was.

This would make students confident of their final exam time, especially while working online and lacking face to face communication.

A relaxed schedule and timing. Have all classes treated like traditional online classes where assignments/exams open up and either close at midnight that day or they are open for days. This would allow students to create a schedule that works best for their schedule.

I struggle to find the motivation to do my work. If we did not have COVID-19 and classes went on as normal, I would have gotten mostly B's and some A's but now I will be lucky to get C's. Overall, this has been more stressful than regular college.
I'm not even sure if this is possible, but could PFW establish their own servers to run something like WebEx, so students can just piggyback onto the teacher's PFW server. It seems like that might make it less glitchy? I'm no expert. I'm thinking of a model based on how some video games work, something like call of duty. I think they have dedicated servers that players log on to, instead of the primary connection being based on a person's individual internet connection.
