Our First Destination Survey provides you with comprehensive and reliable information about recent Purdue University Fort Wayne graduates. You can use this data to help make decisions about your education and career goals, as it will give you a snapshot of what's possible with a degree earned at Purdue Fort Wayne.

In addition to assisting you in shaping your future, the First Destination Survey helps Purdue Fort Wayne meet the requirements of the Higher Education Opportunities Act.

The survey also provides information to the Purdue Fort Wayne community, the media, and those who hire.

Strong Results—76% Response Rate

We surveyed students graduating from Purdue Fort Wayne between July 1, 2017, and June 30, 2018. A total of 1,455 graduates received the First Destination Survey. We had 1,110 participate, with a response rate of 76 percent. Responses were gathered beginning three weeks prior to graduation and ran six months following graduation.







of salaried respondents reported earning a salary over \$30,000.











- » Established in 1964 in Fort Wayne, Indiana
- » Chancellor: Ronald L. Elsenbaumer
- » Largest university in northeast Indiana
