ON YOUR WAY TO A MASTER'S DEGREE

When you complete a Transition to Teaching program, you will be 2-4 classes away from completing a master's degree in elementary education, secondary education, or special education.

LOCALLY FOCUSED, ACCESSIBLE TO WORKING STUDENTS

Students learn with and from professional educators in their region—mostly online. Our hybrid program allows students to get to know professors and classmates through a limited number of in-person meetings, but complete most classwork through online instruction and assignments.

In-person meetings are held on Saturdays or evenings during after-school hours.

PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

Non-Degree Programs:

These non-degree programs lead to an initial Indiana Department of Education teacher license in the area of Elementary Education (K-6), Secondary Education (5-12), or Special Education (P-12) when all criteria are met.

Admission Requirements:

Admission to the Purdue Fort University Wayne Transition to Teaching (TTT) programs requires a baccalaureate degree from an accredited postsecondary institution with:

- an official transcript reflecting 3.0 or higher on a 4.0 Grade Point Average Scale or
- an official transcript reflecting 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 Grade Point Average Scale and documentation of five (5) years of professional experience <u>or</u>
- an official transcript reflecting 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 Grade Point Average Scale and proof of passing state approved content area examination(s) in the subject areas;
- Secondary TTT program also allows for the completion of a graduate degree from an accredited postsecondary institution in the subject area or related field in which the person wants to teach

In addition, all students must submit the following documentation for admission to the program:

- Criminal history report
- Statement of purpose
- 2 letters of reference
- Resume

To be recommended for an IndianaTeacher License, you must also complete the following:

- Pass all required examination(s)
 - Elementary Education
 - Praxis Content Exams: Exam #5006, including subtests Exams #5007 (Elementary Education: Reading & Language Arts and Social Studies) and #5008 (Elementary Education: Math & Science)
 - Praxis Pedagogy Assessment Exam #5622 (Principles of Learning and Teaching: Grades K-6)
 - Secondary Education
 - Praxis Content Exams vary by area of study; ask your advisor
 - Praxis Pedagogy Assessment Exam #5624 (Principles of Learning and Teaching: Grades 7-12)
 - Special Education
 - Praxis Content Exam #5543 Special Education: Core Knowledge and Mild to Moderate Applications
 - Praxis Pedagogy Assessment Exam #5625 (Principles of Learning and Teaching: Grades PreK-12)
- Successfully pass all required coursework as listed in the Plan of Study for the program with a grade of Cor higher
- Complete all program assessments at or above the minimal level of acceptable performance
- Maintain a GPA in the program of at least 3.0 on a 4.0 point scale
- Obtain CPR/AED/Heimlich certification
- Complete education and training on the prevention of child suicide

Master's of Science

Students wishing to pursue a Master's of Science in Education degree <u>may apply all of the credits earned</u> as part of the TTT program to that associated degree option.

**Applicants to the TTT Special Education program who currently hold an Indiana Elementary Generalist initial teaching license are exempt from completing the Elementary Reading Block provided six credit hours of equivalent course work was previously completed as verified through a review of the applicant's undergraduate university transcript.

PROGRAM TIMELINES

1 YEAR Program

Start in May for Elementary or Secondary Education

16-MONTH Program

Start in August for Special Education

SELF-PACED

Start in any term, in any program, and take courses as they are available for a lighter course load

STEPS TO APPLY

- 1. Application: To begin your application create an account through the portal at <u>gradapply.purdue.edu/apply</u>. Applicants can make and save changes before submitting by logging in with the username and password used to create the account.
- 2. Transcripts: Official transcripts and/or academic documents for every institution of higher education you attended regardless of whether or not a degree was received must be submitted to the PFW Office of Graduate Studies. If a degree was received then it must be printed on the transcripts. If the documents are not in English, you must upload an English translation certified by the college or university that issued it. All candidates must hold a four-year undergraduate degree or equivalent in any discipline from a recognized institution.
- 3. Criminal History Report: A Criminal History Background Report is required.
- 4. Two Recommendation Letters: Submit names of two individuals who are qualified to evaluate your academic or on-thejob performance who can attest your ability to pursue graduate work. In the online application to the Purdue Graduate School, once you click "Send to Recommender," each individual will receive an email with instructions on submitting their recommendation online. Once submitted, the graduate program to which you applied will have access to view your recommendation.
- 5. Statement of Purpose (Essay): The statement of purpose should be 300-500 words concerning your purpose for undertaking or continuing graduate study, your reasons for wanting to study at Purdue, and your professional plans and career goals. You also may explain any special circumstances applicable to your background and elaborate on your achievements, abilities, and/or professional history.
- 6. Resume

OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS

You must provide official transcripts and/or academic records at the request of the graduate program or if you are admitted and choose to enroll. An official transcript bears the original signature of the registrar and/or the original seal of the issuing institution. An unofficial transcript printed from your current/previous institution(s) student system is not an acceptable document. Domestic transcripts must be mailed directly from a Registrar's office to the Office of Graduate Admissions. (You can choose to send the transcripts yourself, but the transcripts must be in an envelope sealed by the Registrar.)

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
