

WHO'S WHO IN THE COMPANY

OLIVIA ALBERTSON (Bun) is a senior pursuing a B.F.A. in Musical Theatre. Last seen on stage as Lulu in *Cabaret*, Nathan Wolfe, A Jewish Man in *The Catastrophist*, Toropetzkaya in *Black Snow*, a Spirit in *The Tempest*, Little Sally in *Urinetown*, Jo March in *Little Women: The Broadway Musical*, Sally Perks in *Puffs!* and Molly Aster in *Peter and The Starcatcher*.

KALAM DENNEY (Gowdie) is a junior pursuing a B.F.A. in Musical Theatre. Denney was previously seen on the PFW stage as a Spirit in *The Tempest*, Dr. Billeaux /One of the Poor in *Urinetown*. Credits from Union City Jr/Sr High School were Matilda in *Matilda the Musical*; Olive Ostrovsky in *The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee*; Mrs. Peacock in *Clue: The Musical*; Sally Brown in *You're a Good Man Charlie Brown*; and Princess Elenora in *A Dark and Stormy Knight*.

EMMA HOUSER (The Red Head, Dance Choreographer) is a senior pursuing a B.A. in Theatre. Stage credits include her performances in *Elephant & Piggie's* "We Are in a Play!", Hot 'n' Cole, The Tempest and Urinetown. Houser was dance captain for Urinetown, Hot 'n' Cole, and choreographer for The Tempest, and *Elephant and Piggie*. She has crewed for Peter and the Starcatcher, Little Women, and The Catastrophist. Houser studied dance for 13 years at Fort Wayne School of Dance.

CARTER THURNALL (The Love Talker, Fight Choreographer) is a psychology major in his junior year. Carter has previously worked as the master electrician for *Cabaret* and *The Catastrophist*. His stage credits include Lee Turner in *John Proctor is the Villain*, and Woody in *Six Degrees of Separation* at the FW Civic Theatre, the Ringmaster in *Elephants Graveyard* and Karl in *Big Fish* at the Blackbox Theatre Co.



WHO'S WHO IN THE PRODUCTION STAFF

JEFFREY C. CASAZZA (Director) Last year, Jeff directed The Catastrophist at PFW and performed the role of Mark Rothko in Red at the Fort Wayne Museum of Art for Civic Theatre. PFW audiences might also remember his recent performance as Officer Lockstock in *Urinetown: The Musical*. He spent the spring and summer completing numerous sabbatical projects including travel to Turkey and Greece to research historical sites related to the Trojan War for a devised production he plans to create at PFW exploring Greek Mythology, The Illiad, and other aspects of the lives and loves surrounding the Homeric heroes and Historical events currently titled Troy: Desire, Decision, Destruction. He also presented his research and creative endeavor at an international conference, continued work on a chapter for an upcoming book to be published by Routledge exploring the Margolis Method (an internationally renowned contemporary performance method which he uses regularly in classes and rehearsals), completed his level 5 certification in Margolis Method, and trained in a number of areas related to staging theatrical intimacy. Jeff regularly creates productions as a director, devisor, and playwright. His devised productions of Dracula: An Act of Destruction and Frankenstein: An Act of Creation are part of his devised Gothic Trilogy, to be concluded at some point in the future with Jekyll: An Act of Transformation. A few of his other favorite directing projects at PFW include The Tempest, Eleemosynary, Puffs, Sophocles' Antigone (which he also wrote), and A Midsummer Night's Dream. Jeff is one of about 300 Designated Linklater Teachers in the world and is excited to share this work here and with the Fort Wayne Community. He continues his ongoing research into contemporary performance methods pursuing his level 6 certification in the Margolis Method, and his ongoing certification process in Authentic Voice. Jeff has received numerous awards for his teaching, research, and creative endeavor, some of which include: The Featured Faculty Award for Excellence in Teaching (2022), the Friends of the University Outstanding Teacher of the Year Award (2021), The Leepoxy Award for innovative teaching (2013), and two Featured Faculty awards for Research and Creative Endeavor (2014 and 2019).

AUSTIN M. RAUSCH (Costume Designer) is an Assistant Professor of Theatre – Costume Design at Purdue University Fort Wayne. He holds an M.F.A. in Costume Design from The Pennsylvania State University and a B.A. from St. Edward's University in Austin, TX. Notable PFW design credits include Cabaret, The Tempest, Urinetown, and Little Women: The Musical. Professionally, he has designed for Bigfork Summer Playhouse (Something Rotten!, Footloose, The Addams Family) and Purdue University West Lafayette (Dead Man's Cell Phone). Austin's pedagogical research explores fear and creativity, with

presentations at national conferences and a publication in the *International Journal for Education and the Arts* titled "Fear and How It Inhibits Creativity." He also recently co-presented "Bridging Creativity and Connection: UDL-Driven Gamification for Powerful Analysis" at the 2025 CELT Fall Teaching Conference. In addition to design and pedagogy, Austin directed *Black Snow* at PFW in April 2023.

COREY E. LEE (Lighting Designer/Lighting Shop Supervisor) is a Clinical Assistant Professor of Theatre for the department and a graduate of Purdue Fort Wayne. Lee holds an M.F.A. in theatre design and production (University of Memphis), a B.A. in theatre, and a B.S. in secondary education with an emphasis in earth/space science (PFW). Before returning to Purdue Fort Wayne, he served as the Visiting Assistant Teaching Professor in Lighting Design for the Department of Theatre and Dance at Ball State University, where his designs included Gloria, Kinky Boots, and Groove: Interlocking Cultures Through Movement. Lee was previously the lighting designer and technical director at the Fort Wayne Civic Theatre. His designs include Sweeney Todd: The Demon Barber of Fleet Street, Jekyll and Hyde, Matilda, Rock of Ages, The Rocky Horror Show, Disney's Newsies, Avenue Q, and Memphis. Previous lighting design credits also include Sondheim on Sondheim, The Glass Menagerie, Into the Woods, The Laramie Project (PFW), Peter and the Starcatcher (Arena Dinner Theatre), Holiday Pops (Fort Wayne Philharmonic) and Seussical (University of Saint Francis). Corey has also worked with Huntington University, Mikautadze Dance Theatre, Fort Wayne Youtheatre, Embassy Theatre, Manchester University, Fort Wayne Ballet, Fort Wayne Summer Music Theatre, Summit City Music Theatre, Three Rivers Music Theatre, Fort Wayne Dance Collective, and Northrop High School

ROBERT SHOQUIST (Scenic Designer/Technical Director/Production Coordinator) holds an M.F.A. in stage design (Northwestern University) and a B.A. in directing and design (Boise State University). At Purdue Fort Wayne, Shoquist teaches stagecraft, introduction to stage management and theatre production I and II. His scenic designs include Elephant & Piggie's "We Are In A Play!", Cabaret, Hot 'n' Cole: A Cole Porter Celebration!, The Bald Soprano, Little Women: the Musical, Peter and the Starcatcher, Sondheim on Sondheim, The Laramie Project, Grease, Ghetto, A Year with Frog and Toad, Once Upon a Mattress, Romeo and Juliet, Pride & Prejudice, Little Shop of Horrors, Blithe Spirit, and Stupid F*@%ing Bird. Regional and local credits include Ghost Girl (Workshop Theatre, NYC); Marry Me A Little (Harbor Lights Theater, NYC); The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee, Nunsense, The Honky Tonk Angels (West Virginia Public Theatre); My Fair Lady, Anything Goes and Dirty Rotten Scoundrels (Allenberry Playhouse, Penn.); and Shrek the Musical, Les Misérables, A Few Good Men, Cabaret, and Spamalot (FW Civic Theatre).



JEANNE PENDLETON (Costume Shop Supervisor) graduated with distinction in 2002 from Humboldt State University in Arcata, California, with an M.F.A. in costume design. After receiving her degree, she moved to Pigeon Forge, Tennessee, to costume shows for Dollywood, as well as create garments for the namesake of the park, Dolly Parton. Prior to her arrival at Purdue Fort Wayne, Pendleton worked at the LORT D Clarence Brown Theatre in residence at the University of Tennessee–Knoxville. While there, she supervised the construction of costumes for many professional and regionally known designers. As an active freelance costume designer, she regularly collaborates with Mikautadze Dance Theatre as well as several other area theatre companies.

EMMA CRITES (Stage Manager) is a sophomore pursuing a B.A. in Directing. Emma has worked as the Assistant Stage-Manager for *Cabaret, John Proctor* is the Villain, and Elephant & Piggie's: "We Are in a Play!". Emma hails from Prairie Heights and performed as Jane in *Tarzan* and Mrs. Peacock in *Clue*.

MEAGAN VANDERLAAR (Intimacy Choreographer) is an intimacy choreographer, actor, director, and teaching artist with a B.A. in Theatre from Purdue University. She is continuously training with Theatrical Intimacy Education and is thrilled that her first project with the PFW Theatre Department is this haunting production. Past intimacy direction credits include *Macbeth*, *Much Ado About Nothing*, and *Tom Sawyer*.


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
