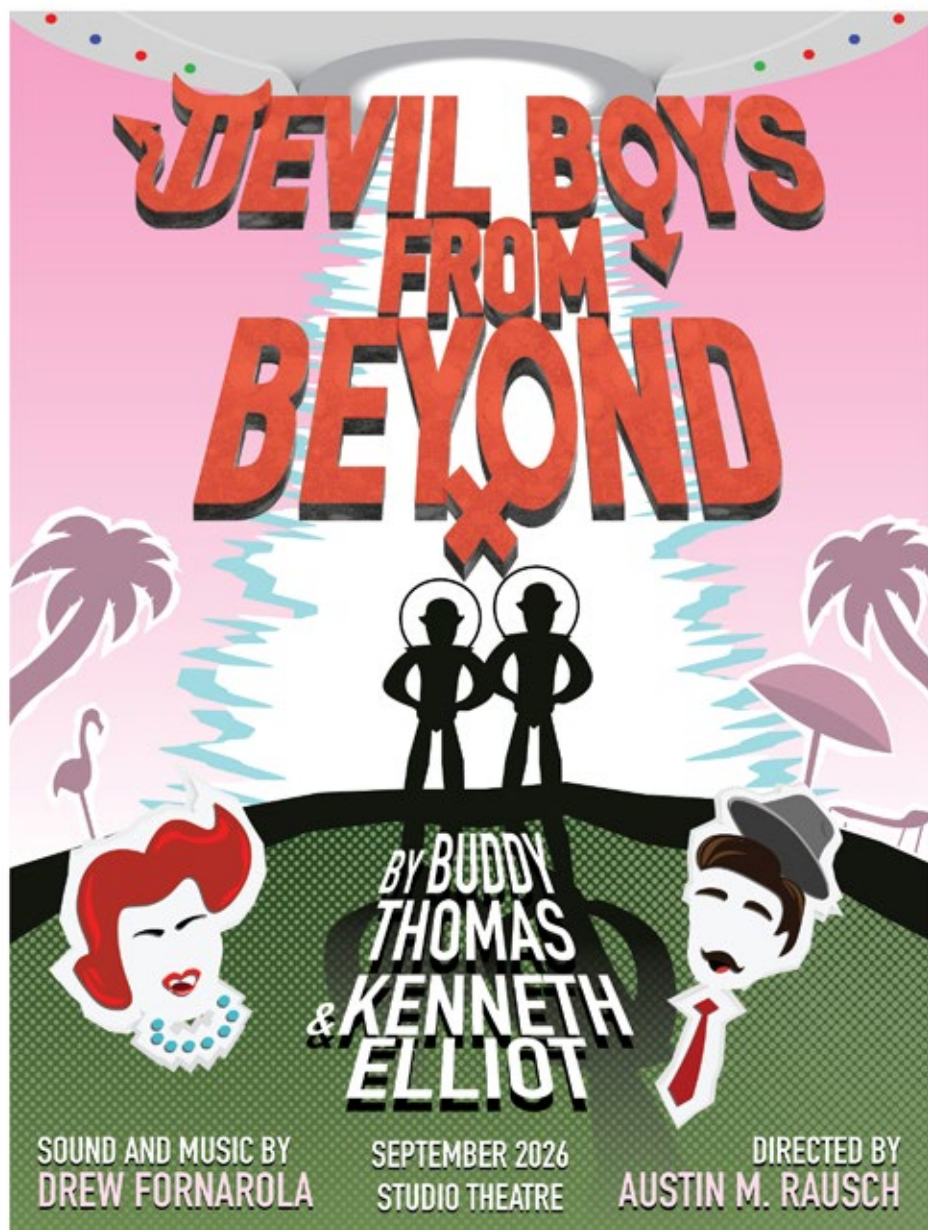

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

We all have a soft spot (a guilty pleasure, to some) for a play (or a musical, or a film, or a TV show) that lets you in on the joke. One that knows exactly what it's doing and knows you're watching it do that thing. And it delights in getting caught in the act of it. *Devil Boys from Beyond* is exactly that kind of show. You certainly can't miss the flying saucer, the heartless divas, the bloodthirsty reporters, and the Floridian flamingoes, all melting together in the sweltering summer of '57. It's like if Tim Burton's cult classic *Mars Attacks!* crash-landed into a *Days of Our Lives* episode. It is camp in the truest sense. Everything in quotation marks, nothing realistic, but every bit of it true at the same time. That's the trick of camp: a moment where something gets exaggerated just enough, we finally "see" it clearly. The gender roles, the power plays, the performances we all put on to survive a room... they are always a little ridiculous, right? This play just turns the volume all the way up until we can't pretend otherwise.

Camp has always been a queer language, born from people who learned early that survival sometimes meant performance. Survival also meant that if the world was going to insist we were "other," we might as well make it fabulous. *Devil Boys from Beyond* doesn't just borrow that language, it speaks it fluently, joyfully, unapologetically. It's actually almost closer in spirit to *La Cage aux Folles* than anything trying to play it "straight." There's something deeply moving to me about a piece of theatre that is, on its surface, pure silliness (recognizable aliens, bombastic wigs, or a performative mid-century Hollywood affectation). And yet, the same piece is asking real questions about who gets to be taken seriously, who gets to be the hero, what we act like when we don't get what we want, and who we allow ourselves to be when nobody's judging. Drag, in this production, isn't a costume. It's the whole philosophy. It's the version of ourselves we choose to bring into a room, and the joy of choosing it out loud, together.

This cast has been building something spectacular together: a room where passionate failure is success, where discomfort means growth, and where kindness (not cruelty), fuels the slapstick comedy fused with inappropriate language and garish spectacle. My hope is that you feel that generosity, the love, radiating off the stage, even in the middle of the chaos. Because underneath every ridiculous wig and phony alien invasion is a question: when the world tells you exactly who to be, what happens when you decide to be something else entirely? And have the audacity to enjoy it?

Welcome to Lizard Lick. Buckle up.

JULIE LYN BARBER (Intimacy Choreographer) is a director, choreographer, music director, actor, singer, playwright who has worked with Portland Center Stage, Portland Opera Association, triangle! theatre productions, Richmond Shakespeare Festival, NW Classical Theatre, Dayton Opera, Round Barn Theatre, and Theatre Under the Stars (Vancouver) among others. At PFW she has directed *Hot 'n' Cole: A Cole Porter Celebration*, *The Spitfire Grill* and *Cabaret*; music directed *The Taming of the Shrew: The March for the Vote*, and served as Assistant Intimacy Choreographer for *John Proctor is the Villain*. Recent professional credits include playing "Frau Blücher" in *Young Frankenstein*, "Alice Beane" in *Titanic*, and directing *Whodunit: The Musical* for Actors Theatre of Indiana (Carmel, IN), performing in *Hoagy & Cole: Indiana Music on my Mind* at Feinstein's at Hotel Carmichael (Carmel, IN), and playing "Alison" in *Fun Home* with Southbank Theater Company (Indianapolis, IN). Her original plays and musicals have been performed in the U.S. and Canada, and she operates an online voice and acting studio offering personalized coaching to students worldwide.

EMMA CRITES (Assistant Lighting Designer) is a junior pursuing a B.A. in Theatre with a concentration in Design and Technology. Stage Credits include *Cabaret*, *Elephant & Piggie's "We Are in a Play!"*, *The Love Talker*, and *The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee*. Behind the scenes, Emma was an Assistant Stage Manager for *Cabaret* and *Elephant & Piggie's "We Are in a Play!"*, spotlight operator for *The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee*, stage manager for *The Love Talker*, and she designed lighting for *We the People*.

DR. MATTHEW GIALLONGO (Vocal Coach) has been praised for his "beautiful voice and singing with great depth of feeling." Equally at home on the operatic and concert stages, he has appeared with Opera Fort Collins, South Bend Lyric Opera, Indianapolis Opera, Actors Theatre of Indiana, and the Portsmouth Symphony Orchestra. Favorite roles include Papageno (*Die Zauberflöte*), Nardo (*La finta giardiniera*), Belcore (*L'elisir d'amore*), Silvio (*I pagliacci*), and Picasso in Tom Cipullo's *After Life*. As a teacher and mentor, Dr. Giallongo has guided students to success in competitions, graduate schools, and summer programs across the country. His students have earned admission to institutions such as the University of Michigan, the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, and Indiana University, as well as young artist and training programs that prepare the next generation of professional singers. Dr. Giallongo's scholarly work focuses on comparative vocal pedagogy, with an emphasis on French methods at the turn of the 20th century. He recently completed the first English translation of Jules Lefort's *Méthode de chant* and published an article in *Inter Nos*, the National Association of Teachers of Singing (NATS) *Inter Nos* titled "Notes in Conflict:

The Voice Teacher as Music Director." He is also a frequent presenter at conferences, with upcoming work including a presentation at the National NATS Conference in San Antonio. He currently serves as Director of Vocal Studies at Purdue University Fort Wayne and has previously held faculty appointments at Eastern New Mexico University, Louisiana Tech University, Grambling State University, and Colorado State University–Pueblo. Dr. Giallongo holds degrees from Gettysburg College (B.M. in Vocal Performance), Temple University (M.M. in Vocal Performance), and Colorado State University (M.M. in Vocal Pedagogy). He pursued postgraduate study at the University of North Texas before earning his D.M.A. at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, where he studied with William McGraw.

IZZY KANE (Assistant Stage Manager) is a sophomore pursuing a B.A. in Theatre with a concentration in Design Technology. Izzy has previously crewed as the Deck Electrician in *The Taming of the Shrew: The March for the Vote* and Light Board Operator for *The Love Talker*. Izzy also assists with the Community Arts Academy's Saturday Morning Theatre Classes.

COREY E. LEE (Lighting Designer/Lighting Shop Supervisor) is a Clinical Assistant Professor of Theatre for the department and a graduate of Purdue Fort Wayne. Lee holds an M.F.A. in theatre design and production (University of Memphis), a B.A. in theatre, and a B.S. in secondary education with an emphasis in earth/space science (PFW). Before returning to Purdue University Fort Wayne, he served as the Visiting Assistant Teaching Professor in Lighting Design for the Department of Theatre and Dance at Ball State University, where his designs included *Gloria*, *Kinky Boots*, and *Groove: Interlocking Cultures Through Movement*. Lee was previously the lighting designer and technical director at the Fort Wayne Civic Theatre. His designs include *Sweeney Todd: The Demon Barber of Fleet Street*, *Jekyll and Hyde*, *Matilda*, *Rock of Ages*, *The Rocky Horror Show*, *Disney Newsies*, *Avenue Q*, and *Memphis*. Previous lighting design credits also include *Sondheim on Sondheim*, *The Glass Menagerie*, *Into the Woods*, *The Laramie Project* (PFW), *Peter and the Starcatcher* (Arena Dinner Theatre), *Holiday Pops* (Fort Wayne Philharmonic) and, *Seussical* (University of Saint Francis). Corey has also worked with Huntington University, Mikautadze Dance Theatre, Fort Wayne Youtheatre, Embassy Theatre, Manchester University, Fort Wayne Ballet, Fort Wayne Summer Music Theatre, Summit City Music Theatre, Three Rivers Music Theatre, Fort Wayne Dance Collective, and Northrop High School.

ELIZABETH MIKAUTADZE (Choreographer) Elizabeth graduated from the Boston Conservatory, MA with a B.F.A. in Dance after studying with Judy Williams Henry and The Movement Laboratories Youth Ensemble, PA, The Hungarian Ballet School in Budapest, and The Milwaukee Ballet. She further developed her dance training on the East Coast while dancing professionally



with The Buglisi/Foreman Dance Co. (now known as Buglisi Dance Theatre), The Mereminne Dancers, The Martha Graham Dance Ensemble, and while training at The Martha Graham School and Alvin Ailey Dance Center, among other NYC dance schools. Elizabeth moved to the Midwest and began sharing her dance knowledge while teaching modern and ballet techniques and master workshops at The Fort Wayne Dance Collective, Elite Dance Center, New American Youth Ballet, The Indiana Dance Festival, and Tri-County Dance Academy. Elizabeth currently teaches modern, jazz, and ballet as an adjunct professor at Purdue University Fort Wayne (PFW) and founded the PFW dance company-in-residence, Mikautadze Dance Theatre (MDT), with husband and music director David Mikautadze in 2012. Since MDT's inception she has choreographed over 70 works and continues to build a repertoire that is versatile and timeless. Elizabeth also currently teaches ballet for the competitive team, Evolve Dance Force, and serves on the Artist Advisory Panel at The Fort Wayne Dance Collective. She is thrilled to have had the opportunity to work with Austin and the PFW Theatre students in *Devil Boys from Beyond!*

JEANNE PENDLETON (Costume Designer/Costume Shop Supervisor) graduated with distinction in 2002 from Humboldt State University in Arcata, California, with an M.F.A. in costume design. After receiving her degree, she moved to Pigeon Forge, Tennessee, to costume shows for Dollywood, as well as create garments for the namesake of the park, Dolly Parton. Prior to her arrival at Purdue Fort Wayne, Pendleton worked at the LORT D Clarence Brown Theatre in residence at the University of Tennessee–Knoxville. While there, she supervised the construction of costumes for many professional and regionally known designers. As an active freelance costume designer, she regularly collaborates with Mikautadze Dance Theatre as well as several other area theatre companies.

AUSTIN M. RAUSCH (Director/Wigmaster/Makeup Supervisor) is an Assistant Professor of Theatre at Purdue University Fort Wayne. His primary area of expertise is costume design, and his passion for character informs not only his designs, but his drag performances and directorial/playwriting pursuits. Austin has performed drag in Texas, Pennsylvania, California, and Fort Wayne. His ongoing work as a wig stylist, make-up artist, and costume designer has given him an embodied understanding of character transformation: an interdisciplinarity that also shapes his teaching and scholarship. Austin frequently teaches the department's GenEd performance courses, and his article "Fear and How It Inhibits Creativity in Performance Arts Education" (*The International Journal of Education in the Arts*) examines his use of gamification and Universal Design for Learning (UDL) principles like connection and autonomy in the classroom. Austin directed *Black Snow* for the Department of Theatre in 2023 and recently produced an abridged reading of Karel Čapek's 1920 play, *Rossum's Universal Robots*. This reading

directly inspired his in-process adaptation of the play, for which he has recently received the Development of a Creative Work Grant from the Association for Theatre in Higher Education (ATHE). Austin holds a B.A. in Theatre from St. Edward's University and an M.F.A. in Costume Design from The Pennsylvania State University.

TRISTAN ROBINSON (Assistant Stage Manager) is a senior pursuing a B.F.A. in Musical Theatre. Stage credits include Mitch Mahoney (*The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee*), Tulsa (*Gypsy*), Flotsam (*The Little Mermaid*), Ensemble (*The Color Purple*), and Jimmy #1 (*Grand Hotel*). He has crewed for *Romeo and Juliet*, *Rocky Horror Picture Show*, and *The Taming of the Shrew: The March for the Vote*.

ROBERT SHOQUIST (Scenic Designer/Technical Director/Production Coordinator) holds an M.F.A. in stage design (Northwestern University) and a B.A. in directing and design (Boise State University). At Purdue Fort Wayne, Shoquist teaches Introduction to Stage Management and Theatre Production I and II. His scenic designs include *The Spitfire Grill*, *The Taming of the Shrew: The March for the Vote*, *The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee*, *The Love Talker*, *Elephant & Piggie's "We Are In A Play!"*, *Cabaret*, *Hot 'n' Cole: A Cole Porter Celebration!*, *The Bald Soprano*, *Little Women: the Musical*, *Peter and the Starcatcher*, *Sondheim on Sondheim*, *The Laramie Project*, *Grease*, *Ghetto*, *A Year with Frog and Toad*, *Once Upon a Mattress*, *Romeo and Juliet*, *Pride & Prejudice*, *Little Shop of Horrors*, *Blithe Spirit*, and *Stupid F*cking Bird*. Regional and local credits include *Ghost Girl* (Workshop Theatre, NYC); *Marry Me A Little* (Harbor Lights Theater, NYC); *The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee*, *Nunsense*, *The Honky Tonk Angels* (West Virginia Public Theatre); *My Fair Lady*, *Anything Goes* and *Dirty Rotten Scoundrels* (Allenberry Playhouse, Penn.); and *Shrek the Musical*, *Les Misérables*, *A Few Good Men*, *Cabaret*, and *Spamalot* (FW Civic Theatre).



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AUTHOR BIOGRAPHIES

BUDDY THOMAS is a widely produced playwright, and is the author of, among others, *The Crumple Zone*, which was an off-Broadway hit in the 2000-2001 season starring Mario Cantone. It has been produced around the world, with major U.S. productions in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle and elsewhere, and foreign productions in Spain, Italy and the Netherlands. *Devil Boys from Beyond* premiered at the New York International Fringe Festival in 2009, where it won the FringeNYC Award for Outstanding Play and then went on to transfer to an off-Broadway run at New World Stages. The play was nominated for the 2010 GLAAD Media Award for Outstanding New York Theatre, and for Best New Play by the Off-Broadway Alliance. Other plays include *Physical* and *Spotlight*. Mr. Thomas is also an agent at ICM Partners, where he represents many internationally known writers, artists and estates.

KENNETH ELLIOTT co-authored *Devil Boys from Beyond* (with Buddy Thomas) and directed its premiere at the 2009 New York International Fringe Festival (Fringe Award for Outstanding Play), as well as the 2010 Off-Broadway transfer at New World Stages. His directing credits include revivals of Mart Crowley's *The Boys in the Band* in New York and London, *The Green Heart* at Manhattan Theatre Club (Outer Critics Circle Nomination), and Aviva Jane Carlin's acclaimed one-woman show *Jodie's Body* at the Arlight Theatre and the Sundance Theatre Festival. He co-founded Theatre-in-Limbo with Charles Busch, and directed, produced, and sometimes acted in the original productions of many of Mr. Busch's Off Broadway comedies such as *Psycho Beach Party*, *Times Square Angel*, *The Lady in Question*, *Red Scare on Sunset*, and *Vampire Lesbians of Sodom*, which played more than 2000 performances at the venerable Provincetown Playhouse and became the longest running non-musical in the history of Off-Broadway. Regional theatre credits include The Asolo Theatre Center, Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park, The Denver Center, The Wilma Theatre, Bay Street Theatre Festival, Prince Music Theatre, the Cape Playhouse, and The Cleveland Play House. He received his B.S. and M.A. in Theatre from Northwestern University, and his Ph.D. in Theatre from U.C.L.A. He is currently associate professor of theater and chair of the Fine Arts Department at Rutgers University in Camden, and his university theatre productions there have included *Tartuffe*, *Angels in America*, *Measure for Measure*, *Dracula*, *A Doll's House* and *The Glass Menagerie*.

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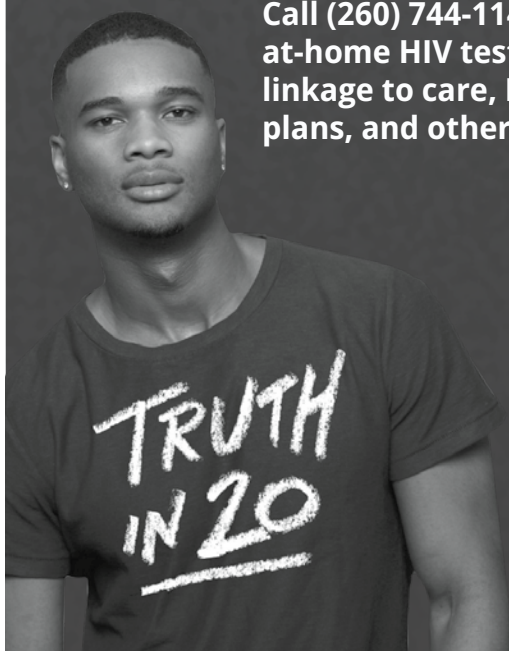

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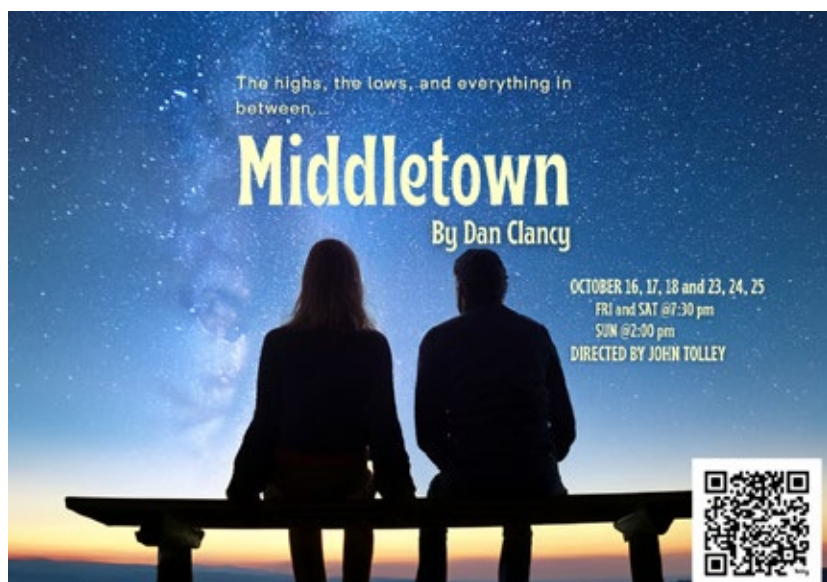

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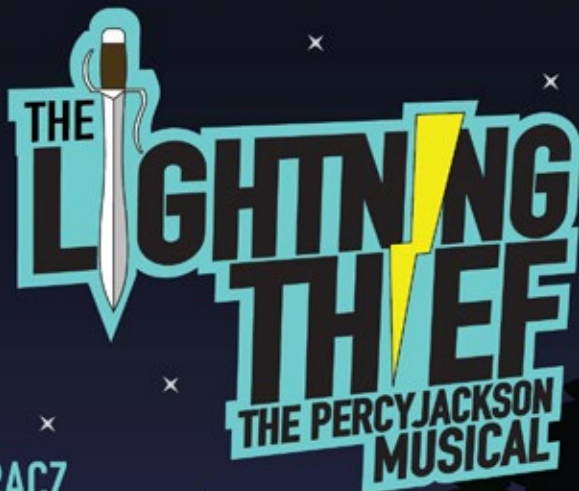
